#### INTRODUCTION

The booklet "Nailsea – a Handbook of Dates and Events" is still available from N&DLHS through this web site.

The organiser of a Pageant planned to welcome the new Millennium to Nailsea asked me for some events that he could recreate as part of the activities. When unfortunately lack of support meant that the project had to be scrapped I had a number of items recorded from secondary sources that it seemed a pity to "waste".

I then decided to examine the books that I had in my possession and others available through the library service. I did not carry out any research on original documents. The books are listed in the "Sources section". I took notes of each event that I came across and over a period of time the information increased far beyond my original expectation. The booklet on which this list is based was published by me in 1998. In producing the book in A5 format the entries were slightly truncated. This version which is in "A4" format has enabled me to go back to the original draft. This does mean that the size of the text and the amount of room for information has slightly increased but some fine tuning incorporated in the original printed edition may be missing.

The Society in making this "list" available to all would appreciate any necessary corrections being brought to its attention. However please do remember that the "list" shows what appears in secondary sources and no attempt has been made to update or correct any errors other than obvious ones.

I hope you find this list useful and that readers who need accuracy as to a precise date will explore the records that are available in Somerset and North Somerset.

Where doubt exists about a date or where the reference is to a period an \* has been placed in the column adjacent to the date. Usually the text will explain the meaning of \*. No attempt has been made to ensure that entries in a particular year are in chronological order.
